## What you will have learnt by the end of Key Stage 1:

At the end of Key Stage 1, you will have a good understanding of what an opinion is. You will be able to talk to people about your opinions and give reasons for them. You will also be able to consider other people's opinions. You will have some good listening skills and will be able to ask good questions. You will be able to identify which communities and groups you are part of and understand the role you play within them. You will know why looking after the environment is important and be able to explain how to do this well. Finally, you will be able to describe positive behaviours that you should have in and outside of school, as well as what a school council is.

#### Overview

#### Positive Contributions

Classroom Life:


It is important to contribute positively to classroom life through my kind actions and words. You should listen to your own needs and can identify the needs of others. If you need support, you can ask a trusted adult such as a family member or teacher.

It is my responsibility in solving some of my own problems. You will learn techniques to help you with this. Some techniques are:

- Talking to a trusted adult
- Talking to a friend
- Writing my worries down

You are part of different groups and communities. You will be able to name these groups and explain your part in them. Some of the groups and communities you belong to are:

- School
- Your Family
- Any clubs or teams you are part of
- The wider community where you live



Looking after the environment is very important. It helps to keep our world happy and healthy. Some ways you can look after the environment are:

- Recycling
- Upcycling
- Walking or cycling
- Growing plants
- Compost bins
- Reducing plastic waste

Which of these things do you do at home? Which do we do at school?

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#### Behaviour

Discussion and Debate:

Sometimes problems can arise at home, at school or in the wider community. Some problems are bigger and more meaningful than others. It is important that you can discuss these problems with your friends and family, offering your opinions and listening to the opinions of others. This can sometimes happen in the form of a debate. You should be able to provide reasons for your opinions and accept those of others

#### School Council

#### Voting

A school council is a group of children who are elected by their peers to represent them and to help improve the school. Usually, two children per class are selected. They are also responsible for promoting participation in a range of school, community and national events.

Ask your teacher if your school has a school council and how it is used to decide things within your school

You are allowed to vote for a council member.

#### Being a member

Being a member of the school council is an important responsibility. You would represent the ideas of your class, rather than just yourself.

To be a good member of the school council, you should be able to:
